

SUBURBAN UTOPIAS/FAMILIAR FRONTIERS

Rodney Alan Greenblat, a young artist from the East Village in New York, has been visiting artist for 1985 at the Australian Centre for Contemporary Art. This is his first Australian exhibition and all of the works in it have been created in Melbourne.

His work is typical of the East Village, only in that it is cheekily at odds with the current established Soho concerns and styles, and is created with a localised New York audience of budget-conscious domestic collectors in mind.

Its roots are in his suburban, middle-American upbringing with its memories of toy train-sets, California colours, hot dogs, hamburgers and visits to Disneyland. He recalls a childhood in which he was surrounded by "things" – objects he made, broke, fixed or transformed.

In art school he was part of a generation which felt it had to rebel against the prevailing minimalist/conceptual aesthetic: one which looks back to the by then established Pop art style for its inspiration of which the great master was, of course, Warhol.

Rodney Alan Greenblat's brightly painted sculptures mischievously occupy an ambiguous area between sculpture and furniture, fine art and function. His pictures and drawings hover between cartoon-like children's book illustration and neo-Pop painting. The imagery is of suburban, apple pie America, humorously transformed into a Rodneyland utopian world of wide-eyed red-roofed houses with straight pink paths on neat green lawns. His storybook characters – blond haired, blue eyed boys and girls – frame and witness inexplicable events, such as 'The Day the Bank Exploded' (Cat.6), or are involved in some fragment of a Spielberg-like narrative as in 'The Discovery' (Cat.1). They are incidents and events with beginnings and ends, but without middles or vice versa.

The intent of the work is toward a deliberate ambiguity, the humour is lightly surrealist, the titles are both wacky and wonderful and the real subject is fun.

The ACCA is pleased to have hosted the visit of Rodney Alan Greenblat and to have been the venue for his first Australian exhibition.
