

Explores the way in which Melbourne has been documented through the lens of various photographers.

Whilst stylistically diverse, three main themes emerge from the photographs.

For some photographers Melbourne is a city of people - their work revealing both an extraordinary mix of people and cultural practices and specific cultural events which give Melbourne its distinctive qualities.

Other photographers capture Melbourne's physical reality - its architecture and streetscapes. A third group have chosen Melbourne as their imaginative starting point producing photographs which deal with issues relevant to this and other urban environments.

A selection of prints from historic glass negatives from the Melbourne Police Forensic Archives.

Whilst the images were originally intended to provide forensic evidence in criminal investigations, the specific details of their incident - including crime, date, location, photographer - have since been lost. The images present vacant street scenes and empty places which appear to be filled with narrative significance.

Paradoxically, the loss of precise information surrounding the images promotes a studied fascination.

Photography is studied as a tool of both detection and deception in the forensic procedures of looking, spying and recording. The city is explored as the site of a mystery, and the photographic document as a source of disputed truth.






