

Dial H-I-S-T-O-R-Y is the unofficial chronicle of world-wide airplane hijacking. Clips from archival news, home movies, propaganda films and cartoons are spliced together, the soundtrack jumps between seventies soundtracks and a narrative taken from Don deLillo's Mao II and White Noise, but the whole remains steadily focused on the apparent complicity of terrorism, the media and government.

We are led from the relative innocence of the sixties hijacker-revolutionary, to chilling anonymous destruction in the nineties, by way of Tokyo, Tel Aviv, Algiers, Beirut and Lockerbie. Horror appears between snatches of banality or kitsch, hostages are shot, planes blown up, hijackers executed. The Japanese Red Army, Fidelistas, Black Panthers, the PLO and the CIA all have their cameo roles; and so do the airhostesses, the pilot enjoying five minutes of fame, the cute kid who says he would do it all again if he didn't have to go back to school.

The archive footage provides a parallel history of the evolution of television, from black and white to colour, with theme music, soundbites, logos and links. Film gives way to video and finally to camcorder: now everyone has the chance to shoot their own catastrophe. The TV set is the medium for the intrusion of violence and anarchy into the intimacy and order of the home. Grimonprez concocts the same queasy mixture of glamour, banality and horror that we are regularly fed by the media.
